A Letter of Farewell from Deacon Dan Huth

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



The service will be a meaningful proclamation of the joy that is ours through the sending of the Word made flesh, Jesus!



What a joy it is to adorn the nave with high praise and thanksgiving during the season of Advent, especially through the silent song being sung by our “O Antiphon” banners!

The exact origin of the “O Antiphons” is not known, but it has been noted that Boethius (A.D. 480-524) made a slight reference to them in his writings, thereby suggesting their presence at that time. At the Benedictine Abbey of Fleury in France (founded in A.D. 640), it is fairly well documented that these antiphons were recited by the abbot and other abbey leaders in descending rank, and then a gift was given to each member of the community. By the eighth century, they are in common use in the liturgical celebrations of the Western church. The usage of the “O Antiphons” was so prevalent in the church that the phrases, “Keep your O” and “The Great O Antiphons” were common sayings. One may thereby conclude that in some fashion the “O Antiphons” have been part of our liturgical tradition since the very early public gatherings of believers.

You will note that there are only seven antiphons, and yet we have an eighth banner. It has been suggested that in their origin, the antiphons were ordered with a definite purpose. If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each antiphon - Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words *ero cras* are formed, which are translated, “Tomorrow, I will come.” Therefore, the Lord Jesus, whose coming we have prepared for in Advent and whom we have addressed in these seven glorious antiphons, now reminds us that He will return in glory at the Last Day, of which we know neither the day nor the hour. And so the final banner declares that this is most certainly true!
