What a joy it is to adorn the nave with high praise and thanksgiving during the season of Advent, especially through the silent song being sung by our "O Antiphon" banners!

The exact origin of the "O Antiphons" is not known, but it has been noted that Boethius (A.D. 480-524) made a slight reference to them in his writings, thereby suggesting their presence at that time. At the Benedictine Abbey of Fleury in France (founded in A.D. 640), it is fairly well documented that these antiphons were recited by the abbot and other abbey leaders in descending rank, and then a gift was given to each member of the community. By the eighth century, they are in common use in the liturgical celebrations of the Western church. The usage of the "O Antiphons" was so prevalent in the church that the phrases, "Keep your O" and "The Great O Antiphons" were common sayings. One may thereby conclude that in some fashion the "O Antiphons" have been part of our liturgical tradition since the very early public gatherings of believers.

You will note that there are only seven antiphons, and yet we have an eighth banner. It has been suggested that in their origin, the antiphons were ordered with a definite purpose. If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each antiphon - Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words *ero cras* are formed, which are translated, "Tomorrow, I will come." Therefore, the Lord Jesus, whose coming we have prepared for in Advent and whom we have addressed in these seven glorious antiphons, now reminds us that He will return in glory at the Last Day, of which we know neither the day nor the hour. And so the final banner declares that this is most certainly true!

## **SCHOOL NEWS**

To help our students to be mission minded and encourage good stewardship, mission opportunities are planned each year. So far this year our students have been involved in the following projects:

From September to November, all chapel offerings were designated to POBLO International, a Christian organization working to transform the way missions is approached in the United States by responding to the changing demographics that have brought the mission field to our own front yard. This organization serves immigrants and refugees. They also train and educate churches on how to engage in cross-cultural outreach. A total of \$1221.97 was collected and will be sent to support the work that they do here in Michigan.

Chapel offerings for the months of December, January, and February will be designated for The Lutheran Hour Ministry's online mission trip to Guatemala. Our Savior will participate in the live online video feeds from Guatemala and St. Louis during Lutheran Schools Week at the end of January. Our accumulated chapel offerings for these months will support the mission work being done in Guatemala.

Each classroom also has a "mission can" to collect loose change, and sometimes larger amounts of money, to support the Ferry family in Southeast Asia. So far this year \$90.19 has been collected to support this effort.

Thanks be to God for the generosity of our students and their families.
