What a joy it is to adorn the nave with high praise and thanksgiving during the season of Advent, especially through the silent song being sung by our "O Antiphon" banners!

The exact origin of the "O Antiphons" is not known, but it has been noted that Boethius (A.D. 480-524) made a slight reference to them in his writings, thereby suggesting their presence at that time. At the Benedictine Abbey of Fleury in France (founded in A.D. 640), it is fairly well documented that these antiphons were recited by the abbot and other abbey leaders in descending rank, and then a gift was given to each member of the community. By the eighth century, they are in common use in the liturgical celebrations of the Western church. The usage of the "O Antiphons" was so prevalent in the church that the phrases, "Keep your O" and "The Great O Antiphons" were common sayings. One may thereby conclude that in some fashion the "O Antiphons" have been part of our liturgical tradition since the very early public gatherings of believers.

You will note that there are only seven antiphons, and yet we have an eighth banner. It has been suggested that in their origin, the antiphons were ordered with a definite purpose. If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each antiphon - Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words *ero cras* are formed, which are translated, "Tomorrow, I will come." Therefore, the Lord Jesus, whose coming we have prepared for in Advent and whom we have addressed in these seven glorious antiphons, now reminds us that He will return in glory at the Last Day, of which we know neither the day nor the hour. And so the final banner declares that this is most certainly true!

SCHOOL NEWS

Each year the students of Our Savior partner with the Board of Social Ministry in a benevolence collection to prepare and distribute baskets of food and other basic necessities for families in our parish and community that are in need. The school students help with this project by collecting nonperishable food and personal hygiene items as well as commonly used household products. The first collection and distribution this school year was just before Thanksgiving.

The Board of Social Ministry asked that our collection this fall be a bit different than in the past. The requests for assistance from struggling families often include certain items that are difficult for them to purchase with other forms of assistance that they may receive. A points system was used to encourage the donation of the items of greatest need. Ten points were given to each item that was collected from the list of items of greatest need and one point for all other items. The students and their families responded by collecting items totaling almost 5000 points, most of them from the ten point list.

They will do this again this coming week to help Social Ministry prepare for the baskets they will distribute at Christmas. Thanks be to God for the generosity of our students and their families.
