REVERENCE IN THE LORD'S HOUSE

The writer to the Hebrews urges, "Thus let us worship, with reverence and awe..." (12:28). Solomon writes in Ecclesiastes 5, "Guard your steps when you go to the house of God. To draw near to listen is better than to offer the sacrifice of fools..." (5:1). In part, Martin Luther defined "the sacrifice of fools" as irreverent conduct by those who show they will not listen to the Word of God (LW 15:76). In order to maintain reverence in the Lord's house, we ask that 1) men remove their hats, 2) mobile phones, tablets, and gaming devices be turned off and put away, and 3) with the exception of parents providing appropriate snacks for small children, please refrain from bringing food and/or drink into the holy spaces.

THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood is celebrated in the Divine Service. Participation in the Lord's Supper indicates unity in faith (1 Corinthians 10:16-21). Visitors desiring to commune are asked to first speak with the Pastor. Ushers are available to arrange a meeting prior to the service. Parents who bring children to the altar to be blessed during the Lord's Supper, to avoid spillage, please refrain from giving them the individual communion cup after you have communed.

Athanasian Creed LSB 319

Whoever desires to be saved must, above all, hold the catholic faith.

Whoever does not keep it whole and undefiled will without doubt perish eternally. And the catholic faith is this,

that we worship one God in Trinity and Trinity in Unity, neither confusing the persons nor dividing the substance.

For the Father is one person, the Son is another, and the Holy Spirit is another.

But the Godhead of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit is one: the glory equal, the majesty coeternal.

Such as the Father is, such is the Son, and such is the Holy Spirit:

the Father uncreated, the Son uncreated, the Holy Spirit uncreated;

the Father infinite, the Son infinite, the Holy Spirit infinite;

the Father eternal, the Son eternal, the Holy Spirit eternal.

And yet there are not three Eternals, but one Eternal,

just as there are not three Uncreated or three Infinites, but one Uncreated and one Infinite.

In the same way, the Father is almighty, the Son almighty, the Holy Spirit almighty; and yet there are not three Almighties, but one Almighty.

So the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God;

and yet there are not three Gods, but one God.

So the Father is Lord, the Son is Lord, the Holy Spirit is Lord;

and yet there are not three Lords, but one Lord.

Just as we are compelled by the Christian truth to acknowledge each distinct person as God and Lord, so also are we prohibited by the catholic religion to say that there are three Gods or Lords.

The Father is not made nor created nor begotten by anyone.

The Son is neither made nor created, but begotten of the Father alone.

The Holy Spirit is of the Father and of the Son, neither made nor created nor begotten, but proceeding.

Thus, there is one Father, not three Fathers; one Son, not three Sons; one Holy Spirit, not three Holy Spirits.

And in this Trinity none is before or after another; none is greater or less than another; but the whole three persons are coeternal with each other and coequal, so that in all things, as has been stated above, the Trinity in Unity and Unity in Trinity is to be worshiped.

Therefore, whoever desires to be saved must think thus about the Trinity.

But it is also necessary for everlasting salvation that one faithfully believe the incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Therefore, it is the right faith that we believe and confess that our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is at the same time both God and man.

He is God, begotten from the substance of the Father before all ages; and He is man, born from the substance of His mother in this age:

perfect God and perfect man, composed of a rational soul and human flesh;

equal to the Father with respect to His divinity, less than the Father with respect to His humanity.

Although He is God and man, He is not two, but one Christ:

one, however, not by the conversion of the divinity into flesh, but by the assumption of the humanity into God;

one altogether, not by confusion of substance, but by unity of person.

For as the rational soul and flesh is one man, so God and man is one Christ, who suffered for our salvation, descended into hell, rose again the third day from the dead,

ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, God Almighty, from whence He will come to judge the living and the dead.

At His coming all people will rise again with their bodies and give an account concerning their own deeds.

And those who have done good will enter into eternal life, and those who have done evil into eternal fire.

This is the catholic faith; whoever does not believe it faithfully and firmly cannot be saved.

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Brothers and sisters in Christ,

The Lord be with you.

I'm going to have to move very quickly this morning. For those in worship yesterday, you'll remember hearing in the prayers that our sister in Christ, Lois Bidinger, was called home to the Lord's nearer presence this past Thursday. The funeral is today. Visitation begins at 10am and the service is at 11am. There's much to do in between. Still, there's time right now to free-think a little, hopefully to both our benefits.

Of course, how can any of us not be moved to exclaim with concern, "What a world we're living in right now!"?

Pandemics. Failing economies. Skyrocketing unemployment. Brutality. Death. Divisions. Riots. America's list is rather long these days.

Like me, I'm sure many of you are consuming your fair share of articles offering a wide array of perspectives on all of this. Carol Caswell shared an interesting one with me this past week. In it, Harvard Professor of Psychology, Steven Pinker, was noted as suggesting that the ones leveling the most pressure on the governors to loosen the grip of the lockdowns are the Christians, namely, those Pinker refers to as being afflicted by the "malignant delusion" of belief in the afterlife. In his opinion, it's the Christians who are proving themselves to be the enemies of life and are putting their neighbors at risk. In contrast, he believes atheists—people unwilling to trust in the possibility of an afterlife—are the ones showing the truest concern for society's health and safety. Unsurprisingly, they're a significant portion of the voices pressing most fervently for masks, social distancing, stricter government mandates, and longer quarantines.

I read another article (well, more like a blog post) last night that connected a few more of these dots. Written by a supporter of the lockdowns, the post inferred rather disingenuously that everyone is obligated to support the rioting protests no matter how violent they become. I use the word "disingenuously" because the protestors are by no means quarantining, obeying government mandates, practicing social distancing, or wearing proper masks while they burn buildings and empty the local Target store of its wine and fat fryers. The irony is thick. But it's overlooked and given room to breathe. Why? Well, because in the blog writer's mind, the violence is justified, being the proper reward for thousands of years of oppression fostered by Judeo-Christianity. In other words, he blamed the riots on Christians.

Both of these are interesting perspectives. Ignorant, but interesting. And certainly you, the reader, will take from them whatever you want. I've learned that much along the way of sharing things like these.

For those of us who follow the historic lectionary in worship, we've heard a lot lately about how the world is in vigorous opposition to Christ and His Church. Sunday after Sunday for several weeks of the Easter season, the Lord has reminded us from John 14 and 15—sometimes subtly, and other times directly—that the world (the collective of sinful humanity in opposition to God) is waging open war against God's people.

Simply put, Jesus kept reminding us that the world hates us. But He said this is only true because it hates him most of all (John 15:18-25).

At one point along the way, the Lord unpacks this hatred by reminding Christians they are distinct from the world and the world knows it. It's not because of anything inherent to any of us, but rather because by the work of the Holy Spirit for faith (whom the Lord speaks about over and over again throughout John's Gospel), God has claimed us as His own.

"If you belonged to the world, it would love you as its own. As it is, you do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world. That is why the world hates you" (John 15:19).

For as frightening as this particular verse might be, it certainly does help make sense of the seemingly imbalanced nonsense Christians face day in and day out. We can understand why Professor Pinker would believe as he believes, while at the same time being one to justify keeping the local Walmart open during the lockdown—a place where thousands upon thousands of people visit in a single day, touching this and that item before putting it back on the shelf undecided, and not one single employee in sight to sanitize any of it. Scientifically speaking, Walmart is a biohazardous mess. But Pinker, and others in the blogosphere, can turn blind eyes to such things and be found supporting both violence as well as a Governor's threatening of churches with fines if they hold in-person worship services, even as the churchgoers practice social distancing within an immaculate worship space that has had every square inch scrubbed and sanitized multiple times every day of the week, and doubly so over the course of the few hours when the congregants actually meet.

One might be tempted to think that the only real way forward for Christians is to step into a silent stride beside the world, to blend in, to do what it tells you, to keep one's head down, and maybe even try to keep one's faith a secret in order to abide. But I see two problems with this.

The first is that the world can smell a Christian a mile away. Clandestine or on the sleeve, a Christian's devotion to Christ will eventually be discovered. The fruits of faith are hard to hide, and the more the world demands submission to its gods and compliance with its rites and ceremonies, the harder it will be for the Christian to continue in the lemming-like stride of ambivalence. Eventually the Christian will be found at the edge of a cliff, and in that moment, the Christian will be aware of the Lord's words to Peter, "Who do you say that I am?" (Matthew 16:15). But the world will be whispering there, too. It will hiss an undercurrent of doubt, asking, "You don't really believe all that stuff, do you?"

It's there the distinction is revealed and the Christian is forced to show his or herself as being in or out of step with the world.

If you haven't experienced moments like this yet, trust me, you will.

I suppose the second problem I have with this is that as Jesus was speaking the words I referenced from John 15:19, in His divine omniscience, He was already mindful of what He preached in Matthew 5:13-16 where He called His believers salt and light. Salt is hard to ignore. Sprinkle a little onto a bite and give it a taste. You'll know it's there. Light is equally noticeable in comparison to darkness. Have a group of people close their eyes, then turn off the lights and

light a candle. When they open their eyes, I guarantee they'll be drawn to the candle's flickering flame long before noticing anything else in the room.

Christians stand out. There's really no way around it. And from the Lord's perspective, this is a good thing. It means He has established us as both servants and leaders in a world filled with death and destruction. We are those who add humble, but steadfast, flavor while at the same time being those who lead with the bright beaming light of truth—namely, the Gospel. Perhaps even better, we are fortified for both of these roles by God's Word, which means we have the source for knowing both *how* and *why* we are salt and light.

The whole of our identity is located in Christ who has redeemed us, reclaimed us, recalibrated us, and re-established us as His people in the world.

But once again, the Lord is careful to instruct us that the first test of this identity is to endure the hatred of a world that would much rather be rid of us. It's almost Biblical the way Shakespeare wrote: "Uneasy lies the head that wears the crown" (Henry IV, Part II). This is true. The crown of righteousness borne by the Christian, while it is a joy for eternal life, it can seem heavy in this mortal life. Still, Christians are given minds to understand the weight of the crown, seeing it for what it is—a baptismal mark that not only designates the bearer as one purchased and won by the Redeemer and an inheritor of the world to come, but as one who has been led into the duty of being a dealer in hope—real hope.

Yes, situations requiring the hope we bring can be sketchy. Carrying the message of Christ crucified into any setting can be risky. But again, Christians have been given the task of doing it, and it is accomplished, for the most part, by just being who we are in Jesus Christ—servants and leaders, salt and light—no matter the flatland, valley, hill, or cliff.

Personally, I think all of this begs deep reflection right now.

And by the way, Jesus has been very clear along the way to say that any ability for reflecting on any of this (discerning the knowing, being, and doing) will be discovered only as we are connected to His Word (John 14:23-31, John 15:1-8). Disregard the Word—both verbal and visible—and your trip over the cliff is all but certain.

In conclusion, I suppose that's my simplest prayer for you this morning is that you would remain fixed in the Word of God in all things, and there, knowing and understanding the world's hatred for you, still you'd be found courageous. I pray for your readiness in season and out of season to be salt and light, fully prepared at the edge of each cliff to step out of stride with this world, if necessary, and "in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15).

And with that, it's on to the news...

- + Just to let you know, assuming Florida moves to Phase 2 of their reopening, which means rental home owners will be allowed to let folks rent from them, the Thoma family will be scooting off to our happy place for two weeks beginning June 12. I'll let you know if things change, although, I suppose we'll remain MIA either way. Pastor Zwonitzer is planning to cover everything, so be sure to reach out to him through the church office if you have a pastoral emergency.
- + Our Summer Sunday School efforts will soon be upon us. We'll be focusing on the Passion of Our Lord, and we'll be doing so as we are led by myself, Pastor Zwonitzer, Pastor Pies, Pastor Dunseth, and Pastor Lunneberg. - + The highly unscientific results from the Survey Monkey effort are in, and it would appear that around 80% of those who responded indicated they watched the online worship service every time they were made available. Surprisingly, a little less than 8% said they didn't watch a single service throughout the entirety of the lock down. This number is way too big in my opinion. Also, it appears about 3% of you watched both Lutheran and non-Lutheran services, while about 30% watched our service as well as other LCMS worship services.

Perhaps I'll fashion another survey that digs a little deeper into the "not once during the whole lock down" crowd, as well as the "both Lutheran and non-Lutheran" folks. Stay tuned.

+ I received the following update from Kantor Swett regarding the loft floor. Looks like we're almost there! Take a look:

Thank you to all who have donated thus far toward the Loft Floor Replacement and Painting project. As of May 26, we are in need of \$1,300 (down from \$2,500 one week ago), which means we are 80% of the way to the goal! At this point, work would not begin until mid-late June at the earliest, so there are still a few more weeks to contribute if you are able to help - It will be greatly appreciated!

+ The following note from our Life Team Leader, Shirley Sturkin, may be of interest to you. Check it out!

There is an update on the dismemberment petition drive, the vetting process has resumed by the Michigan Bureau of Elections. The Bureau has set June 1 as the deadline for Challenges to the signatures. A sample of 500 signatures was pulled by the Bureau, which will determine the overall validity rate of the submitted signatures. Planned Parenthood has said they will consider challenging the signatures. To my knowledge they have not done so as yet. Hopefully I will have another update for the Life Team's upcoming meeting.

+ I received the following from the Trustees. Take a look!

Last fall, in an attempt to help the congregation visualize the various needs around the facility (some obvious and others not so obvious), the Trustees compiled a list of projects that were in front of us. The list quickly grew to roughly 41 separate identified projects. The projects ranged in scope from relatively small to some very large ones. The congregation was asked to review the list and if so moved, support projects

that were important to them individually where they could. We are pleased to report that now, 7 or so months later, we have completed 17 of the projects on the list. Another 5 are "in process" now and a couple more are being planned. Specifically, we would like to move forward in the next month with the choir loft flooring and painting repair project along with the concrete sidewalk repair around the building. Ideally, both projects need to utilize the summer months for completion. Both projects have more than half the funding committed so far and we need another \$10,000 or so to fully fund. With the projects on the list that have not started, they are less urgent and although we still have a ways to go, everyone should stop for a moment and recognize the real significant progress that has already been made. We will provide a more detailed update at the upcoming June congregation meeting. Praise God for His faithful people. A huge "Thank You" goes out to all who supported these projects. The work already completed could not have been accomplished without the numerous members who lovingly provided their time and talents to physically completing the projects and to the many who provided support financially to purchase supplies and equipment.

+ Our six senior catechumens weathered the Great Confession this past Saturday. Congratulations to them on a job well done! Now we'll be looking to confirm them on June 28 in the Divine Service.

By the way, to keep this event in perspective, consider the following note I shared on Facebook after the rite. The point of the note was to show how even as things seem to be coming undone, the Lord is so gracious to provide glimpses into His faithfulness. The Great Confession on Saturday was a chance to behold it.



Our world is once again proving its potential. Things are dark right now—so incredibly dark. It would seem that the only light available to us is that which the white hot and burning cars, storefronts, and police precincts will allow.

But even in the midst of this, the Light of the Gospel for faith in Christ is on the move. Look, and you'll see. It's an unstoppable Light that will never be outshone or

extinguished. Its radiance is everlasting, beaming brightly, no matter the smoldering landscape being singed by so much evil.

Behold, a proof: six young men—future citizens, friends, workers, servants, leaders, warriors, fathers, and grandfathers—all of whom took to the field this morning by way of The Great Confession. The questions leveled in this rite, and the tenor of its ceremony, put these young men before the world's charging doubts, and together they replied by detailing the one true and saving faith, and they claimed this faith as their own. COVID-19 ANTIBODY TESTING REGISTRATION PORTAL

During these trying times we have all come to experience what it is like to live inside of a world full of quarantines, isolation protocols, and daily health updates from government officials. Fortunately, we are now coming to a point with regard to testing where we are finally able to make more headway in terms of availability and accuracy while garnering new epidemiological information about a silent enemy that has changed our world seemingly overnight. HomeMD Housecall Services, a local house call company providing primary care 'on the road' for geriatric and homebound patients across the state is ready to help. Similar to the way that GM retrofitted their assembly lines to make ventilators, HomeMD Housecall Services is expanding their service line to include in-home Covid-19 antibody and swab testing while using their existing systems to get the job done. The purpose of antibody testing, as opposed to the nasopharyngeal throat swabs that have become very familiar to us all, is primarily meant to survey populations so that we can determine whether or not

those within the community have at any point in time been infected with the virus that causes Covid-19. Beyond telling you whether or not your body has generated antibodies through exposure to the virus, which we presume can defend you against future infections, this blood test is able to identify active infections that have made their way beyond the first 5 or 6 days of infection. The test is able to do this because it detects the IgM antibody, which starts to be produced by your immune system about 5 or 6 days into the infection.

Using the information gained from these tests our congregation members can use the results to determine whether or not they have already had the infection at some point and from there whether or not they can presume themselves to have some measure of immunity. In the event you are positive for the IgM antibody we will also collect a PCR swab, which will more definitively tell us whether or not you are actively infected and thus whether or not you are able to pass it along to others. Most studies we have seen indicate that asymptomatic infections account for somewhere between 35% and 78% of Covid-19 infections. Please bear in mind that while most medical providers will presume that those with antibodies present in their blood are immune for some period of time to future infections, there is no hard evidence yet to back up our professional assumptions (just a disclaimer) due to the fact that the virus hasn't been around long enough for us to have studied Covid-19 immunity. It should also be noted that a positive antibody test does not mean that you are bulletproof . . . these tests are constantly being studied and like all tests, there are false positives and false negatives to be accounted for. In the very near future we may also be offering antigen testing once it receives emergency authorization use by the FDA, which will allow for insurances to cover it as they do now for PCR swab and antibody testing.

This service along with the lab work will not cost you anything because any and all Covid-19 related evaluations and/or associated testing is billed out to your insurance with no copay or deductible whatsoever. If you do not have insurance or if our organization runs into network issues with your insurer then Medicare covers the cost of testing regardless of age or insurance status, 100% free without any copay or deductible just as if you had insurance. The only thing we need to submit with uninsured claims or for claims that your insurer would deny is either a patient identifier number either in the form of your driver license number or your social security number. We of course would feel more comfortable if you would provide your driver license number of the form as opposed to your social security number, but either one will work.

The antibody test itself is performed either by a quick blood draw by a phlebotomist (results in 24 hours and more accurate) or by finger prick (similar to diabetic testing) using a rapid immunity test kit (results in about 10 minutes, but with more false positives and false negatives). We utilize both forms of testing depending upon the circumstances and we can provide either one to you. We are also able to provide PCR swab testing to detect for active infections in their first few days along with consequent treatment of active infections, if appropriate and if necessary.

+ The following letter went out last night from our Principal, Deaconess Sara Bielby. Its aim is to share the plan for next school year.

Dear Families,

As you know, it is our mission here at Our Savior to nurture children in the love of Jesus Christ while forming good thinkers who value truth, goodness, and beauty. Our time of online learning has been of value due to the valiant efforts of teachers, parents, and students. At the same time, our current plan for the fall aims at the in-person education that best accomplishes our mission.

In order to do this responsibly, out of concern for our neighbor, we will put some practices in place. Several sources of guidelines and reopening procedures have been consulted. As we witness frequently, recommendations may change in the coming days. Currently, here are some things we might expect:

- Symptom checking requested at home and no-touch temperatures on the way into school
- Care taken to create extra spacing in the classroom
- Finding other options to school assemblies and limiting outside visitors during the school day
- Longer times away from school when sick, or when known exposure to someone diagnosed or presumed (and a continuation of learning at home)
- Increased cleaning protocols, handwashing, and hand sanitizer
- · A confirmed case in the building will trigger a closed day for deep cleaning
- A waiver signed by families expressing an understanding of the risks involved in attending school

It is our intention to be as calm and routine as possible with children and to cheerfully lead by example and good direction. We wish to be considerate of one another and the community of which we are members.

These are the broad strokes of the plan for fall. Currently the Michigan Association of Nonpublic Schools is lobbying for flexibility due to our unique identities and small class sizes. If the health situation in our midst were to change, we would adapt and modify the plan. We are attempting to prepare for these types of contingencies so that we can continue learning. Whatever happens, we are committed to carrying out our mission as long as the Lord who has given it to us wills it.

Our first day of school is scheduled to be Monday, August 24. Orientation will be a scheduled appointment in August prior to that date. I am eager to hear from each of you during your school visit next week. I welcome your open and honest thoughts. May the Lord bless you as you serve Him,
